Three Ways to Electrify Your Lawn Care



Spring is just around the corner, and you can practically smell the freshly-cut grass. If you're in the market to upgrade your lawn care equipment, you may want to consider electric (or battery-powered) options.

Gas-powered lawn mowers and trimmers may be your go-to, but times they are a changin'. Electric lawn care equipment options are becoming more popular than ever, offering consumers faster charging times, longer battery life and

quieter, greener products compared to their gas-powered counterparts. Here are three ways you can electrify your lawn care this spring.

Electric Lawn Mowers

Electric lawn mowers have come a long way over the last few years. Early models required corded connections, which were tricky to manage—but the cord has been cut. Newer cord-less electric mowers are certainly more expensive than gas-powered mowers, but much of the upfront cost can be recovered since electricity is a less expensive fuel than gas, and electric engines generally require less maintenance than gas engines. Cordless electric mowers typically range from \$200 to \$500.

Electric mowers are suitable for most lawn care needs, with batteries that typically require about one to two hours to fully charge, and most batteries can run for a full hour. That said, if you have a large yard (half an acre or larger), a gas-powered option may be best to suit your needs.

Electric Leaf Blowers

After cutting and trimming your lawn, you'll need to clear off those walkways and patios for the finishing touch. If you don't want to deal with the maintenance of a gas-powered blower or the restraints of a corded blower, a cordless electric version is a great option.

Cordless electric leaf blowers are lightweight and easy to maneuver, but they don't offer quite as much power as gas-powered and corded blowers. If your leaf blowing and clearing needs are minimal, a cordless electric leaf blower can get the job done. Costs for a cordless electric blower vary depending on power and battery quality, but you can purchase a dependable model for about \$150 and up.

If you're looking to electrify your lawn care equipment, be sure to do your homework. Search online for the latest reviews, and check trusted websites like ConsumerReports.org. With a little research, you'll be well on your way to Lawn of the Month – with less maintenance, has-sle and noise (and your neighbors will thank you!). ***

The Efficiency Plan & Improvement Commitment (E.P.I.C. Program) is an exciting program offered through your Cooperative. SEC is offering this home energy efficiency program in an effort to assist our member-owners in making significant improvements to their home's energy efficiency.

SEC developed a strategic partnership with Precise Building Performance (Precise), LLC, out of Lawton, Oklahoma. Precise will conduct three specific assessments at the home: 1) Blower Door Test; 2) Duct Blaster Test; and 3) A visual inspection of the attic insulation. At the conclusion of the energy efficiency assessment, Precise will inform member of the results of the assessment.

SEC is sending three eighth grade students to the Oklahoma Association of Electric Cooperatives' Youth Power Energy Camp! An official contest was announced to schools at the beginning of this year. Interested students were instructed to write an essay over the topic "How I Can Have an Impact on Energy Conservation". Entries were due to the Cooperative by the end of February and winners chosen mid-March.



Located at the beautiful Canyon Camp in Hinton, OK., campers, over the course of four fun-packed days, will engage in various leadership and electrification activities. Campers get a first-hand look "behind the switch" to learn how their own homes receive power. In addition to learning how electricity is generated, they also get to meet co-op employees who work together to provide safe, affordable and reliable electricity. During the "Life of a Lineworker" day, campers have a chance to try on safety equipment and climb a pole. They also see a high-voltage demonstration and hear from Oklahoma Energy Trails Foundation volunteers.

"Our goal is for these campers to develop and understand their worth, discover the cooperatives' connection to community, and learn how these relationships all work together," said Stacy Howeth, Energy Camp Director and OAEC's Director of Member Services.
